

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S O F I A 2003 In the summer of 1997, a team of three co-authors lead by Ilya Prokopov prepared and edited the first small book of fake coins which was subsequently published in Sofia. It covered a large group of contemporary fakes of ancient Greek and Roman coins from Bulgaria – 204 coins in gold, silver and bronze¹. The publication was devoted to serving the professional numismatists and amateur collectors and making them familiar with modern fakes and copies. The present catalogue is the result of that first booklet. The second book was prepared by the authors in the same format in 1998. It was not until 2003 that a publisher for this book was found. Prior to publication it was necessary to edit and reformat the manuscript – this publication is the result of that work and reflects information gathered up to the spring of 2003. We encountered strong opposition in relation to this publication not only in Bulgaria but further afield.

We are committed to the sharing of information relating to the identification of modern fakes as well as the negative effect created by the delaying of this process. In choosing from the existing approaches used by the authors of different publications treating this subject, we selected the one that was most appropriate for us and for the specific circumstances of confronting modern fakes. Some authors who prefer the 'global perspective' make a comprehensive survey of trends and 'schools' for making fakes and for counterfeiting worldwide². Others make presentation of the production of certain "monetary masters" whilst others choose the publicizing of forged "hoards" 4.

All these publications and approaches to the problem are indisputably very necessary and useful. We searched for the most appropriate and optimal position, so that we could be useful in the struggle against forgeries. We assume that in this country where fakes are produced in large quantities and in many varieties it is easier to notice and register them before they become dispersed worldwide. This book will follow the principles of the numismatic catalogues with coin descriptions, short notes and observations and good quality photos. We are grateful for the support we received at the beginning of our work by the management of IAPN and especially by Mrs Silvia Hurter and Dr Hans Voegtli, as

well as the numismatic community as a whole. We would like to also thank Mr Dimiter Y. Dimitrov and Mr Boiko Kolev co-authors of the first book about the modern fakes from Bulgaria for their assistance during the preparation of the current publication.

Before we proceed to the catalogue itself we would like to give a brief description of the problem as a whole and of the "technology" of production of the contemporary counterfeiters from Bulgaria, as well.

It is the authors' opinion that the topic of ancient coin fakes, currently being produced, is becoming ever more pressing and sensitive. Additionally the production, distribution and subsequent inclusion in the mass of the original coins are taking place. This is especially true for the high quality samples produced (as close as possible to the prototype i.e. to the ancient originals. Many modern fakes have already been infiltrated into private and public collections. Having been resold several times some fakes acquire a new legitimacy and as time progresses from the moment of production, the more they are being perceived as originals. This is why the problem of the immediate identification of fake coins as well as their elimination from the "contemporary circulation environment" becomes a priority. It is our belief that the best way to do this is by documenting and periodically announcing the existing fakes as they come to our attention.

In the first place the different single samples of contemporary fakes sold and included in some collections could remain out of circulation for different periods of time or even remain undetected in general. This may happen when the owners do not undertake any publishing, insuring of general circulation of the coins in their possession. It is also possible for some of the most perfect samples of contemporary fakes to be accepted as undisputed originals when they are made public after a long period of time. This could bring about the inclusion of unauthentic information in the world cultural and scientific stock, Secondly, an extremely dangerous tendency for counterfeiting total coin hoards already takes place. New hoards are constructed according to the logic and the statistics of the real that are being discovered. Such kind of false treasures could be entirely fake or partially "garnished" with separate specimens of original coins to make them credible. When they are not detected in time the historical truth becomes distorted when they are published in the bulletins and inventories. As this is done mainly by text information the experts using this information could include them in their scientific comments, analyses, dating, etc. in the field of history, archaeology, numismatics, financial and monetary history. Recently, after a surge of the market interest towards the Eastern Celtic and Thracian imitations, active counterfeiting of the above was registered with a great variety of combinations of coin dies. In this book the authors present a portion of such a false hoard consisting entirely of modern fakes of Thasian imitations made in silver.

The authors are convinced that nowadays modern fake production is the deed of Bulgarian "die engravers". Millions of original samples of ancient and mediaeval coins exist in the country. The local collectors, the intermediaries and

the middlemen alone amount to more than several thousand people. This means no difficulty exists for particular individuals to obtain well-preserved originals which could be used as prototypes for modeling matrixes. An extremely modern technology existed in the ex-state-owned, socialist industrial enterprises in the period from the 1980's till the end of the 20th century. This technology was easily accessible for people who used it for their personal interests including the production of good-quality matrixes for coin striking. Thus the producing of large amounts of matrices was made possible and by combining the dies the original process of coin-striking simulated. On the other hand the existence of multiple combinations and variations hampers the process of identification and detection. In Bulgaria nowadays one can buy at low cost many original highly worn out Greek, Roman and Byzantine coins that have been used as kernels (nuclei) for production of coins. Very often the counterfeiters produce the modern fakes by striking them on the original coins. In some instances the fakes are only partially processed, in others - they are entirely new. Thus a phenomenon is created - the concept of an original and a fake, as well as the borderline between these two is being eroded. In parallel with the existence of high-quality fakes there is a tendency of producing big quantities of trivial samples that have a low retail market price. This mass production pours freely into the numismatic heritage and creates future problems thus allowing further information speculations and negative impact on the market prices.

What are the possibilities for the realization of fakes of valuable coins nowadays? Firstly the counterfeiters choose rare and valuable samples with high retail market prices. They make matrixes of real samples using the latest technologies. The new matrixes are processed to look older by stamping the necessary number of "signal", advance copies. This is done in order to smoothen the sharp edges of the matrix and make it look as authentic as possible. Very often with the help of a matrix designed for counterfeiting valuable aurei silver kernels are being struck or extruded until the matrix acquires the desired worn out look. These coins, for example silver ones, are practically "signal", advance copies. The signal coins are destroyed and the fakes of the valuable expensive coins are produced in very small numbers, for example 5 pieces at the most. If the researchers of modern fakes can obtain such a signal coin prior to it being destroyed, this would give them the opportunity to find out what the future valuable aureus will look like.

Usually before the valuable coins are being put on the "market" the counterfeiters create a background of misinformation by producing rough bungled fakes, as well as costly ancient coins. The objective is to make their detection as easy and quick as possible. Thus the high quality fakes will be guaranteed an unhindered penetration through the market.

When exploring the theme of the modern fakes the authors of this book also present examples where possible. Due to the complexity of the matter and the difficulties in gaining access to the "activities" of the counterfeiters many facts

will remain in the imagination and speculation sphere. It is known, for example, that once the high quality fakes are stamped they undergo certain additional processing. The glaze of the fakes should partially fade away so after being stamped they become installed in a mechanically operated cylinder with abrasive substances inside. The fakes are then rotated at a low speed as estimated by the counterfeiters. Finally they will appear is if they have participated in the monetary circulation. This procedure is applied to coins made from all kinds of metals. But it is of special importance to the coins in gold due to their high estimates. Coins in silver, bronze and copper are subject to similar processing and are finally artificially covered with patina, inert materials, dust, limestone, soil and others. Different methods are used - mechanical or chemical. The mechanical processing is practically non-detectable by means of analyses. Sometimes the laying on of substances is made by using very high pressure and a stream of water vapour. When coverage is made with chemical means or with glues, detection can be more successful when analyses are made. Thus glues and polymers used for pasting can be detected. Sometimes coins made of non-precious metals are covered with original patina taken from original antique bronze and copper objects. In most cases this is done after they have been treated with metal brushes. However when a precise analysis is made miniature "fresh" metal particles can be discovered.

The issue about the origin of the metal used for fake manufacturing is also of great interest. Apart from the method in which old coin kernels are used, there are instances when metals from old antique ore deposits are being utilized. This is especially characteristic for the extraction of gold that has the same features as those of the gold used in ancient coins and objects. It was found that in certain ancient mines and regions where metal processing took place in the past, large masses of slag have been taken away. With the help of similar technologies kilograms of the precious metal are being extracted — the characteristics of which are the same as those of the metal used in ancient times.

In Bulgaria legal workshops also exist and they produce replicas of ancient coins upon client's request and also as souvenirs. These replicas are typified by the style of the new master and they are new art objects in nature. The master-forgers usually mark their production by putting a specific sign or inscription. Unscrupulous dealers often erase the sign, polish it, put patina on top and offer the object as an original.

The authors have endeavoured to present in this book examples of work from legal workshops. We are obligated to Mr Slavey Petrov of Haskovo, the famous master of replicas of ancient and mediaeval coins, who kindly submitted all available coins from his own shop to be photographed and published here.

Several more primitive fakes and castings of ancient coins have also been included in the book. The authors aimed at greater completeness of their work.

A part of the materials included herewith is the property of the Archeological Museum in the city of Plovdiv (ancient Philippopolis). Among them one can see 13 dies made of steal to strike modern fake coins. Those dies are shaped as cylinders with diameters between 44 and 55 mm and height between 25 and 30 mm. Each has a main body, made of soft, raw steel of the ST-45 type that has not undergone any thermal processing. The coin stamps themselves are contained inside. They are manufactured in instrumental steel from the Y-8 and Y-10A. Dies have been thermally processed to acquire greater hardness. This is also done in order to stop the steel die from making residual deformations. The expected solidity of the matrixes is over 60 units according to the Rockwell scale. Most probably the two parts have been assembled by warm pounding with a great precision so that a mechanical indivisibility of the whole new part could be achieved. When the matrixes are being analyzed and the big size of the contact surfaces together with the existing fissures on the main corpuses are taken into account, it becomes evident that such matrixes can be used with presses that have a strike or compression amounting to 2-10 tons. Such matrixes are not apt for manual stamping of coins especially when they are made in silver and bronze. It is not possible to achieve a strike of such strength when using stamps with a big surface. Apart from using mechanical presses with an engine, it is possible that similar matrixes are being used with manual screw presses, as in the Middle Ages.5

Nobody knows how many coin dies have been produced until now and what part of the manufactured "products" are present on the market. It is a proven fact however that more and more new fakes emerge every day – from the staters of Philip II, Alexander the Great, Demetrius Poliorcetes, Lysimachus to the exclusively expensive and rare aurei of Manlia Scantilla and Domitius Domitianus, to the coins of the Black Sea cities of Messembria and Apollonia to the trivial copper coins of the Tetrarchic period.

We have been unable to identify every specific "workshop" in which a given coin was produced as this is merely impossible at the present time.

Recently a surge in the production of fakes of Thracian, Greek and Roman artistic objects and vessels in precious metals has been registered — pateras, rhytons, cups, etc, as well as adornments and appliqués. The authors managed to photograph some of these and intend to present them in the next book. Our main aim with this book and subsequent publications is to inform the general public of their discoveries regarding modern fakes, copies and replicas.

Authors

Dr Ilya Prokopov — Expert in ancient coins. Author of around 150 publications in the field of numismatics. Co-author of the first book on modern fakes from Bulgaria. He works mainly on problems of coin circulation in the Balkans in the period 2nd — 1st centuries BC. Dr. Prokopov has elaborated the system about coin dies of the late coinage of the island of Thasos and the First Macedonian Region. At the moment he is working on imitations of Thasian tetradrachms. He used to work as keeper of coin collections in several Bulgarian museums, as Director of the Regional Historical Museum in the city of Kyustendil (anc. Pautalia) from 1988 till 1998, and as Director of the National Museum of History in Sofia from 1998 till 2001. Presently he is chief expert of Gold & Numismatics in First Investment Bank, Sofia. Dr. Prokopov is the initiator and the head of the team preparing and publishing Coin Collections and Hoards from Bulgaria.

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Dr Kostadin Kisyov – Expert in ancient Archaeology. Director of studies for a series of major excavation projects for studying the ancient complexes in Thrace. Author of about 100 scientific articles and studies of the classical archaeology, comprehensive in character. Expert in adomments, jewellery, armour, pottery. Dr. Kisyov is the Director of the oldest Bulgarian museum – Archaeological Museum in the city of Plovdiv in the period 1993–1996 and from 1999 till the present moment. Research associate in Archaeology in the National Museum of History, 1996–1999. Dr Kisyov is a member of the team preparing and publishing coin collections and treasures from Bulgaria.

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Magister Eugeni Paunov — Expert in ancient numismatics of Thrace and in the Balkans. In 1997 he graduated Sofia University with a master's thesis on the Roman Republican coin hoards in Thrace. Part of the results has been published in a separate volume of series 'Glaux' (Milan 2002). Between 1999–2000 he was a curator in the National Museum of History and from 2000 till now he is a curator in the Historical Museum in town of Pernik. Author of a dozen publications in archaeology and numismatics. He is a member of the team preparing and publishing coin collections and treasures from Bulgaria.
